As for us, we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard."

Peter and John were bold and spoke about the truth found in Jesus and the Gospel Good News. This included the healing of the lame (Acts 3), challenging and speaking God's truth into the culture of their day including those that crucified Jesus (4:8-11) and proclaiming that 'Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men and women by which we must be saved' (4:12).

The religious leaders and authorities of the day were not happy with what was being taught and done in the name of Jesus so they had Peter and John seized and questioned (4:13-15). The outcome

of all this was that Peter and John were told to stop what they were teaching and doing in the name of Jesus (4:16-18). This is when Peter and John replied.

On April 1st 2024 the Scottish Government's Hate Crime and Public Order Act came into law (this includes hate speech). Hatred of any kind including hate speech is not something that a Christian can participate in or condone. I am sure that most of those who put together and campaigned for this law did so with the best intentions and to seek to help others.

However, when it comes to hatred, especially hate speech, it is not at all clear how this law will define and draw a clear

and fair distinction between hate speech and someone who just, strongly and passionately, but respectfully, disagrees with the view and positon of someone else. How do you prove beyond reasonable doubt that someone has set out to break this law? I'm not seeking to make a political point here! I'm highlighting a very big danger that has also been highlighted by respected lawyers, judges and the police within Scotland. Is it just me, or did you get the irony too, of such a law being passed on April Fools Day?

What implications does this law have for our freedom of speech? Relationships? Families? Work places? Education

> Local communities? For local churches and their ministries and gospel proclamation? Now it would be entirely wrong to be sensationalist about all this and to get it all out of perspective!

system? NHS?

However, we would do well to recognise the inherent dangers within this law, which will undoubtedly press in on our freedom of speech.

Let's make sure that we never act or speak with hatred. Let's live, act and speak with integrity. Let's teach, hold to and be faithful to God's truth revealed in the Bible. Let's disagree with others graciously, and above all, love others, even our enemies! Let's follow the example of Peter and John... *"Judge for yourselves whether it is right in God's sight to obey you rather than God. As for us, we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard".*

Joy's visit to Nepal in March

"It's really for me? Wow! I didn't think I'd ever have such a good resource."



Tansen. Pun Narayan established the centre in 2013, when he realised that some of the patients in the mission hospital had no safe place to go when they were discharged. You can read more about the vision and journey of New Life centre at http:// tansennewliferehab.com/ The centre has grown and currently cares for 11 clients mainly with psychiatric illnesses. Pun is now retired and spends much of his time with the clients, although finding staff willing to work long term in the centre is proving difficult. The centre is seeking to become self-sufficient and economically viable by growing crops and keeping animals on their land.

This was the reaction of a Nepali teacher when she was given one of the three tablets donated by DBC and Georgetown Primary School. Indira had seen how the apps on the tablet could help students understand and practice reading with phonic sounds but didn't expect to have one to use in her class.

Thank you so much for enabling us to show love and encouragement to teachers like Indira.

Unfortunately, the land on which one of the buildings is situated was undermined by the construction of a road and part of the building collapsed. Several architects and engineers in Nepal have given possible solutions but most suggest it would be wise to wait until after the next monsoon (July and August) in case there is any further movement in the land. Many of you will be aware that money has been raised and donated at DBC for the centre for which they are most grateful. However, they ask that we keep



these funds until plans for the reconstruction of the building are finalised.

With limited resources and little local support, the centre faces many challenges yet is clearly providing a much-needed home, love and hope for these vulnerable folk on the very margins of society. Please pray for Pun and others



involved, for wisdom to make right decisions and for encouragement to keep going. Pray too that we, as a church and as individuals, might know if and how we could continue to give practical support in the future. With thanks.

The Love of God

God is Love (1 John 4:8). It's not surprising then that the primary Christian obligations are centred upon love: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart... soul... and mind... and...You shall love your neighbour as yourself" (Matthew 22:37-39). And Jesus added a new special commandment for His disciples: "... that you love one another as I have loved you..." (John 13:34) - a love clearly beyond the second great commandment above.

V ou may never have thought about it this way before, but whereas faith is a gift of God Ephesians 2:8), to love is actually a commandment. The nature of Godly love is expounded in depth in 1 John 3 & 4 and in 1 Corinthians 13, and these passages make one thing very clear: Godly love is not cheap. Indeed it is a very costly commodity, as we may learn by experience.

In this age of instant gratification we buy on credit what we cannot afford. We abhor long learning curves. When faced with a problem or crisis, we want it fixed NOW - a natural desire which may be reflected in our prayers. We know Jesus healed instantly, and when we or someone close is ill, that is exactly what we want.

But Godly love is for the long haul. Miracles were for the important but temporary purpose of giving accreditation to His identity as the Son of God, and for the accreditation of his apostles. Of course God can still perform miracles and he never forsakes us, but his greater purpose is that we learn to love as he loves.

G od has been loving, saving, blessing, healing, nurturing and teaching mankind faithfully for millennia - ever since the creation of man. He has been a loving Father

towards mankind, and even a loving, faithful husband to unfaithful lsrael.

G odly love is not soppy, sentimental or over-indulgent. It is strong, brave and resilient, enduring over time. It involves risk. It involves service. Sometimes it involves pain and suffering.

C onsider which requires more love, and more reliance upon the Holy Spirit to sustain that love: the ability to instantaneously zap a sick person back to health, or to nurse them for weeks or even years through their sickness or incapacity.

The marriage vows many of us committed to include the words: "for better or worse; in sickness and in health". The wedding ceremony presumes that even human love will need to be very resilient to the varying circumstances of life, and "until death us do part" implies the long haul too. Even grief is a price we pay for love.

G odly love will cost us, and we will need God's Holy Spirit to inspire and sustain it. In fact personal sacrifice is implicit in love, and Christian love and faith are predicated upon an understanding of, and gratitude for, the God who gave Himself in love for us, in the greatest sacrifice of all.

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Treasurer's Report

Total Monthly Income

January 2024	£36,511
February 2024	£26,071

These figures represent the first 67% of financial year 2023/24 with income 80% budget and expenditure 62% of budget. The total income was £226,958 (£5674 / week against a budget figure of £5400/week). Expenditure during this same period amounted to £173,627 (£4451 /week against a budget figure of £5400/week) . The income includes £10,472 for the "food parcel" ministry, which includes a grant, and expenditure of £8714 for this work, a great example of outreach to the community.

We continue to notice the effects of increasing costs for many items but particularly gas, electricity and water rates. The Operating Company is particularly affected by rising food and staffing costs. We are also beginning to see some maintenance and replacement costs for the building being processed.

If you already give regularly, or are considering doing so, and you pay income tax (as the vast majority of us do) you can "gift-aid" your offering which effectively means the church can claim an additional 25p for every £1 you give at no additional cost to you. In the first half of the financial year over £21,700 of our offerings were **not** subject to Gift Aid. Please prayerfully consider whether you can Gift-Aid your giving. You can continue to give weekly, monthly or directly through your bank. Please contact me if you want further information regarding Gift-Aid.
